Spring Clean Up Day Set for May 11th



The City of New York Mills will be picking up items during their bi-annual City-Wide cleanup day which is scheduled for May 11th.

Residents have the opportunity to dispose of their unwanted items and have those items hauled away for them. All items must be curbside by 8:00 a.m. The items to be picked up must be sorted by type. For example, wood items in one stack, small metal items in another and so on. Also, if you would like to have old tires picked up, please make sure that each tire is removed from the rim and that these items are stacked separately.

As in previous years, branches will not be picked up, nor will any hazardous waste products such as fluorescent bulbs or empty toxic containers. Hazardous items, along with paint cans and spray paint cans will be accepted during the hazardous waste drive scheduled for September 11th. Also, the City will not pick up regular household garbage.

There will be a charge for larger items. While the City does not charge for hauling items away,

Neil Perala Retires after Nearly 37 Years with the City of NYM



Neil Perala has bid farewell to nearly a lifetime of work with the City of New York Mills. Neil began working for the City at age 14, mowing, painting and doing odd jobs during the summer months. He began his full-time career officially in the summer of 1978 and has been here ever since. A lot of things have changed within the City in those nearly 37 years. The landscape has changed a lot. Neil remembers one of his first jobs- painting the chain link fence around Central Park with a brush, mowing with a push mower and clipping weeds with a hand clipper. His duties varied widely and

encompassed nearly anything and everything. "He is a guy with such a wealth of knowledge, he truly will be missed. I hope he keeps his cell phone on for some brain picking!" stated Public Works Director Kyle Mattson. Neil's main duties included working with the wastewater department and operation of the liftstations, sweeping and clearing parking lots and streets, and maintenance of the community pool.

Pool Manager Heidi Van Dyke is sad to see Neil retire. "Neil was my "right hand pool man"! At any time I needed him for pool start up, repairs and pool complications ... Neil was there! For as much time as he spent at the pool lending a hand it is hard to believe Neil has never, ever swam in the pool! He claims he can't even really swim! I hope now that he is retired, perhaps he'll come join us for swimming lessons and I would even let

him start in the "Guppie" group. Heidi wants to thank Neil for all his work stating it is greatly appreciated by his "Mudder Hen".

When asked what he will miss the most, Neil said he will miss the people. Through the years he has had a great rapport with the citizens of New York Mills. "There are a lot of great people here", he stated.

As for his least favorites, he said "probably waking up in the middle of the night and running in to work on the lift station, and crawling through sewer pipes and sludge."

The job is not glamorous, and sometimes can be dangerous. Working with gas leaks, around sewer gases and going down into lift stations are just a few examples. He has had a few close calls. Once he was nearly buried in a trench that collapsed during a street project. Another time involved the rescue squad. Neil was working on putting a float in one of the water tanks and dropped a part into the tank. When he reached





Public Works Update

With spring here and summer approaching fast we are all looking forward to get outside to work in the field, yard, flower bed or garden. With all of this work ahead of us, prior to putting a shovel in the ground keep in mind it is Minnesota State Law to call in or submit online a Gopher State One Call locating ticket two full days prior to excavation to find all underground Public Utilities no matter how minor the dig may be (Please keep in mind no private lines are located through "One Call", they are the responsibility of the property owner). There are three easy ways of "calling in a One Call" dial 811, online www.gopherstateonecall.org or call 1-800-252-1166, if you are in need of assistance with submitting a One Call ticket please call 218-385-2213. We also have free informative handouts at our Public Works Shop or the City Office at City Hall regarding all Gopher State One Call rules and regulations.

On the topic of underground utilities and locating, as a reminder the City of New York Mills Public Works Department does not maintain customer side (right hand side outlet of gas meter) gas piping whether it is above or below ground, as a home or business owner this is your responsibility, please regularly inspect piping, especially steel/metallic pipe, checking paint, pipe coating, and for corrosion. Underground piping needs to be

checked for leaks at no more than five years intervals between inspections, plumbing and heating contractors can assist you with this inspection. If needed the City of New York Mills Public Works can assist with locating the buried private gas pipe, please call 218-385-2213, this service is available to NYM Public Works customers, Monday through Friday, 7am-4pm with the exception of holidays we are closed.

This summer is going to be busy for our department with a significant street and infrastructure project which will effect traffic flow around the downtown and a few outer areas, North Main Avenue from Centennial 84 Drive north to East Gilman, North Tousley Avenue from Centennial 84 Drive north to East Gilman, Gilman Street from North Walker Avenue east to Smith Avenue, Cornwell Avenue from Centennial 84 Drive north to East Park Street, Nowell Street from South Main Avenue west to South Walker Avenue, Alley way behind City Hall/Fire Station from North Walker Avenue east to North Broadway Avenue, and a small storm water upgrade on Miller Street on the west side of the grocery/drug store, please be aware of road closures and follow posted signs not only for your safety but for the safety of the workers as well, remember fines double in work zones. Not all locations will be dug up at the same time so this will help and we will be coordinating with the schedule of City Events throughout the summer into the fall.

This year we will be holding the bi-annual City Wide Curb Side Pick-up Monday, May 11, we are using the Otter Tail County Solid Waste Fee Schedule for our rates, how

this works is you are required to purchase tags/stickers from the City Office prices range depending on the type and quantity of whatever is being discarded. Acceptable items are as follows: Trash free Demolition Debris, Electronics, Appliances, Batteries, Tires (off rim), Furniture, Carpet (per yard), Mattresses, Scrap Iron and Metal. Items that are not accepted: Brush, Leaves, Grass clippings, Household garbage, Hazardous waste/materials. Items placed on the curb side that have not been paid for by purchasing tags/stickers or have copied/false identification will be left on the curb for your own disposal. Please be respectful to the rules as we are providing this as a non-profit service to you. Any questions regarding the Curb Side Pick-up call 218-385-2213.

Neil Perala, another long time Public Works Employee retired March 31 after 37 years full time and four summers part time, we will be sad to see him go as he has done so much behind the scenes to keep our community looking as great as it does. Lack of Snow & Cold Temps Bring Continued Danger of Freeze-Ups

With the lack of snow, some residents are still experiencing cold water temperatures and possible freeze-ups. Even with the spring temperatures rising, the frost in the ground continues to descend for a period of time. The spring thaw begins to bring the ground temperature up, but that warm up is from the surface down.

Residents are asked to continue to watch for signs of water freeze-ups in your homes. Because of the cold winter temperatures, frost can cause damage to your water pipes resulting in costly repairs. Signs to look out for include:

- *Discoloration of your water.* This is caused by ice crystals forming in your

water lines, knocking particles of rust loose from the surfaces of water lines.

- *Water temperature.* If you notice your water is a colder temperature coming from the faucet-- temperatures already in the mid- 30's are a sign that you may have problems. To check the temperature, let your water run about five minutes to clear the lines. Next place a thermometer such as a meat thermometer or any thermometer that shows temperatures down into the 30's into the stream.

If you notice these symptoms, leave a faucet in the home run steadily with a pen-

cil-sized stream of water. This will help alleviate freezing problems. Let the stream run continuously. Running it for a short period of time, but then turning it off, for instance overnight, does not alleviate the problem.

At this point, the City will not reimburse residents for running their water. Please know your bill will reflect this usage. The City's

mains are not affected by the frost this year as they are below any frost levels. There has not been a significant number of homes with frozen water lines to warrant a city-wide order to run water this year. The effect of the large volumes of water run last winter put a significant strain on the City's wastewater ponds.

liner with a 1250 gallon per minute pump with a 2000 gallon water tank. It will be put into service after fire depart-


