Brunswick New York Mills Operation Announces Expansion



The Brunswick New York Mills Operations is pleased to announce a facilities expansion of an additional 22,000 square feet to its current manufacturing footprint. The additional space will help further facilitate the Crestliner manufacturing added recently at the

New York Mills plant, and also will improve manufacturing flow and efficiency as well as provide needed warehouse space. This project, which will break ground in early September, is slated to be completed by the end of the year.

Demand has been solid for both the Crestliner and Lund brands of boats that are manufactured at the New York Mills facility. Company officials point out that the success of the operation is due in part to introducing the right product at the right price. Officials added that they spend a lot of time working with

consumers and dealers, listening to what they have to say, and then responding to that feedback. The success of the product introductions emanating last year from New York Mills is a testament to those efforts, as the Company sees robust, early season orders and a great model line-up for 2012 as the result of those efforts.

Finally, the Company lauded its great workforce at New York Mills, who are skilled and passionate about building the best product in the industry. This is exciting news not only for the Company, but also for the community of New York Mills.

Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day Set for September 13th in NYM

It is time for Fall Cleanup! A Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day has been scheduled for Tuesday, September 13th from 10:00 am—2:00 pm at the New York Mills City Garage located at 102 N. Boardman Ave. The service is free of charge for Otter Tail County residents. The collection offers the opportunity for Otter Tail County residents to dispose of hazardous items such as paint, stain, varnish, household cleaners and pesticides, fuel, rechargeable batteries, aerosol products, fluorescent light bulbs (up to 10 bulbs per family), used oil, oil filters (limit 4 per house-

hold) and rodent bait, in an environmentally friendly way. Magazine recycling is also offered at these collections. Business waste is NOT accepted at these mobile collection sites. Also not acceptable are home medical waste or any type of explosives.

New Building will House Community Outreach



Construction has begun on a new building adjoining the NYM Food Shelf. This structure will be the new home for Community Outreach, an organization which provides household items and furniture for households in crisis. Funds for the building were provided in the form of donations with half coming from the New York Mills Lions and the other half coming from the New York Mills Community Fund.

Lions Club members are constructing the building and donating their labor. In the past, items were housed in various places around the community. "It will be wonderful to have one location that is clean, dry

and accessible", stated Jan Parta, one of the group's volunteers.

The Community Outreach group found its beginnings with the area's churches, originally with the St. Peters Social Ministry. The community of Perham had this type of assistance available and was becoming overloaded with needy households from both Perham and New York Mills.

Community Outreach is made up of individuals from throughout the area.

"It's a community effort, really, that started with the area churches", stated Jan Parta. "It was impressive that all the area churches stepped up and got involved". Fundraisers were held to raise money. Local ministers served as good sources for reaching those who needed help. Today, aside from area ministers, Otter Tail Wadena Community Action has played a key role in helping with making connections between families who need the help and the resources available through Community Outreach.

Who can benefit from Community Outreach? Anyone and everyone who has

suffered a crisis such as a fire, tornado or loss of their home, victims of domestic violence, or other family situations which result in a need for help.

Gently used furniture and items people need to establish a household are accepted. There are a few items which are not accepted, so please call to speak with one of the volunteers if you have an item to donate.

Services from the New York Mills Community Outreach are suspended until the completion of their building project; however, if you are in need of assistance, call the Otter Tail Wadena Community Action Council and they will refer you to Wadena or Perham for help.

Two New Firefighters Join NYM Fire Department

Two new firefighters have joined the New York Mills Fire Department force. Nick Roder joined the department in August. Nick, along with his wife Betsy and two boys, live in New York Mills. Nick is Vice President of Farmers & Merchants State Bank.

Erik Kanz joined the Fire Department in August. He lives in New York Mills and is employed by Mark's Electric of Detroit Lakes.

The New York Mills Fire Department consists of 22 members. All members are required to complete the National Fire Protection Association Firefighter I Course and MN Certified First Responder Course or National Registry EMT Basic Certification. Meetings and drills are held twice a month and additional training is held as needed.

The New York Mills Fire Department serves 160 square miles in NE Otter Tail County, proudly serving the cities of New

York Mills, Butler, and Heinola. They also serve all or parts of Newton, Deer Creek, Leaf Lake, Butler, Homestead, Otto and Big Pine Townships. The department provides both fire and EMS services to over 3,500 citizens in our fire district. The department provides initial emergency care with 10 EMT's and 10 first responders.

So far in 2011, the NYM Fire Department has responded to 103 fire and rescue calls.

Farmers' Market to Hold "Tasting Day" September 10th



The New York Mills Farmers' Market is in their 4th season this year. If you haven't stopped by to see the vast variety of items they have to offer, a great opportunity is coming soon. Saturday, September 10, 2011, will be a "Tasting Day at the Market."

Samples of fresh vegetables, pickles, jams, melons, and baked goods will be available. Mark your calendar and prepare for some unusual treats!

The location is still on Centennial Drive next to The Creamery building. Hours are

9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. on Saturdays and Wednesdays.

Although the market had a late start this year because of the cold, wet spring, plans are to stay open until mid-October or as long as the produce lasts! Currently you can find varieties of lettuce, green and wax beans, potatoes, beets, cucumbers, tomatoes, onions, corn zucchini and summer squash, peppers (sweet and hot), muskmelons and watermelons, and farm fresh eggs (eggs on Saturdays only).

Many of the vegetables grown by the vendors are heirloom and unusual varieties that are usually found only in specialty stores. The vendors also take pride in the fact that the majority grow their produce chemically free—without herbicides or pesticides. Produce is "organic" but at everyday prices.

The first of the fall vegetables including several kinds of squash and pumpkins, turnips and rutabagas should be available within the next two weeks.

Many customers look forward to the "added-value" products that most vendors carry. Fresh breads, home made pickles, relishes, jams and jellies are popular. This year a new addition is reusable and washable sandwich bags and hot cup holders made by one of the vendors.

Looking forward to the next season, two of the current vendors are in the process of setting up high tunnels or hoop houses. For the market, this means having produce 4-6 weeks earlier next spring and 4-6 weeks later in the fall. This way, you will be able to enjoy cucumbers in May and tomatoes in June.

Food Support Screening at Otter Tail -Wadena Community Action

Have you ever worried where you are going to find the money to buy groceries? Have you applied for the Food Support Program in the past and been denied? Well then now is a good time to contact the Family Services' Staff at Otter Tail Wadena Community Action. By asking you a few questions about the income sources in your household and how many people live in your home they can screen you to see if you qualify for Food Support. The rules have changed making it easier for a family to qualify. A family of four can earn a gross income of \$3032/month. They have also eliminated an asset limit, so

your home value is not considered in the qualifications.

The Food Support program allows you to maintain a balance in your account so even if your monthly amount is small (the minimum is \$16/month) you can bank the amount over several month and use your EBT Card when you need extra groceries, such as during the holidays.

If it appears you qualify the Family Services Staff is available to help you complete the application and make any necessary copies. Please contact us at 218-385-2900 or toll free at 800-450-2900 to be

screened. Family Service Staff is also able to refer families and individuals to Local Food Banks, Energy Assistance, Medical Assistance and the Free and Reduced Meal Program at school.

- Can attend monthly meetings (third Thursday of every month at 5 pm)


- Is willing to help with Library fundraising

OT-Wadena Community Action Offers Free Mortgage Counseling

A husband and wife are having a conversation. Wife tells her husband "We are having trouble making our mortgage payment since you got laid off. A man called the other day. He said he can help us lower our interest rate and our payments. We just have to send him \$3,500." Husband replies "Where are we going to get that kind of money, even if it's to save our house?"

If this is a situation that sounds familiar to you, call the Family Services Department at Otter Tail Wadena Community Action. We have trained mortgage assistance counselors you can speak with for free, no fees involved. We can review your situation, discuss

your options to reinstate your mortgage, and help you understand the steps in the foreclosure process. Counselors can help with loan modification paperwork, and negotiations with your lender. We can also help with copying or faxing necessary documentation that the mortgage company needs to review a family for work out options.

Many individuals are getting stressful daily phone calls from their mortgage company or offers from profit companies stating they can fix credit/mortgage issues for a fee. A homeowner with the help of our counselors can follow the same process at no cost.

Counselors at Otter Tail Wadena Community Action can not always stop a foreclosure. Each situation is different, but

counselors are able to help homeowners make decisions based on the facts of their case, and inform a homeowner of their rights during the process.

Mayor's Corner-

It is that time of the year again when we have to begin working on and planning the budget for the upcoming year for the city of New York Mills. I wish I could say that everything is in place and we will present a planned budget to the council for approval that is comparable to last year's. Unfortunately as it now stands, that is not going to be the case for fiscal year 2012. While last year's tax levy was held to only a 3.55% increase, this year's tax levy may exceed 15%. Looking back several years we have not had a double digit tax levy increase since 2004 when we saw a 13% increase. I believe it is our responsibility and obligation to the residents of New York Mills to go into a

little detail as to what is causing that drastic increase.

Our budget consists of two parts, the General Operating Fund, which is used to pay the general operating expenses for the city, and the Bond Fund, which is the fund where money is placed to pay the indebtedness created from borrowing money to pay for recent infrastructure projects. During the past three years we have held our General Fund levy constant or flat even though we have lost almost \$152,000 in LGA funding due to the Governor's unallotment of LGA funds to our city. In fact, last year our 3.55% levy increase went entirely to pay the increased debt of our bond fund rather than supporting our General Fund.

This year's drastic increase is again due mainly to our loss of LGA funding. We are scheduled to receive approximately

\$71,000 less than anticipated in LGA funding, which means that if we again hold our General Fund levy flat we will need a tax levy of more than 15% just to make up for the lost LGA. To create a budget for the city we ask each department head to submit a detailed preliminary budget request to our budget committee. Once the committee receives these requests they meet and review each request line by line. During our first two budget meetings we have grudgingly cut more than \$50,000 from the requested budgets and will be once again sending those revised requests back to department heads and again asking them to fine tune their requests even further.

How this tax levy increase will affect individual property owners we cannot currently answer. We met with the Ottertail County Auditor for more

than an hour last week to see if he would be able to supply us with those figures and he also was not able to give us the numbers we were looking for. It seems that the State shut-down which lasted more than three weeks put the State behind in supplying the necessary data to county auditors to calculate those figures. Our preliminary tax levy request has to go into the State Auditor's office no later than September 15. Once this request has been submitted we cannot raise it any further, but most importantly we can lower it and most years this is what happens. Our final levy request is made during the month of December, which means that we still have time to come up with a final budget that will be more favorable than currently anticipated.


